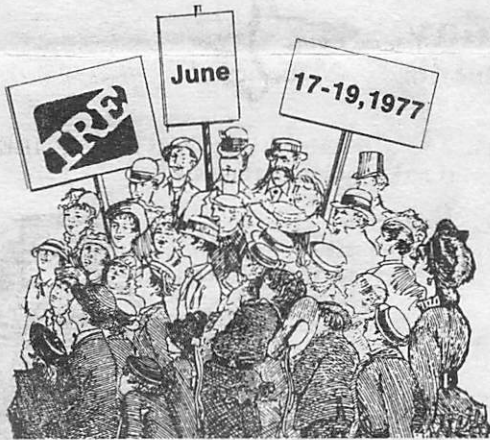

PAUL WILLIAMS

1922-1976

Paul Williams, professor of journalism at Ohio State, was a founder of Investigative Reporters and Editors.

Paul won the Pulitzer Prize in 1973. As managing editor of the Sun Newspapers of Omaha, he headed a five-person investigative team that examined the finances of Boys Town. His was the first weekly newspaper to receive a Pulitzer for investigative reporting.

As vice president and director of IRE, he was instrumental in beginning the Arizona project after the murder of reporter Don Bolles.

Paul died last fall. This national meeting is a tribute to him.

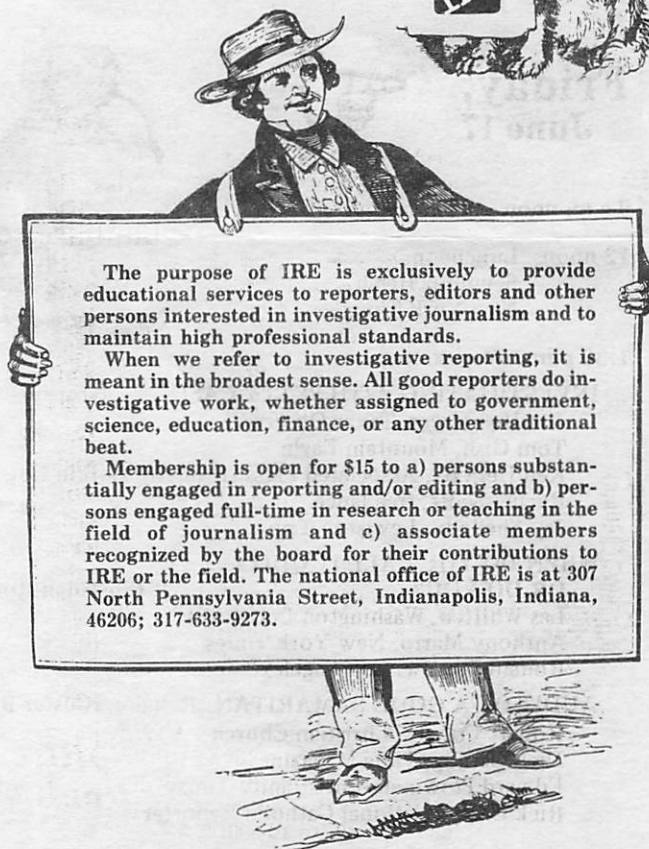
